

American Voters' View on Aquaculture

Poll Report | June 2024





A recent poll conducted by Environmental Defense Fund and Global Strategy Group shows that voters overwhelmingly support doing research into aquaculture to understand its benefits and risks and set the appropriate standards. They recognize its potential to resolve some of the toughest challenges communities are facing today, including boosting the economy broadly and easing personal finances.

Voters believe it's time to explore expanding aquaculture because 90% of seafood is imported, and half of that is farmed. They recognize it's time for the U.S. to farm seafood here to ensure what Americans consume is safe and healthy, and so we can capitalize on the economic benefits we are currently missing out on.





Do voters agree or disagree with each statement?



84% agree

The U.S. is currently importing 90% of it's seafood, and half of it is farmed. Doing the research to figure out how to do it here will expand **economic opportunity.**



82% agree

The U.S. is currently importing 90% of it's seafood, and half of it is farmed, but it's not up to the same **health and safety standards** we have. Doing the research to figure out how to do it here will ensure we consume safe seafood.



80% agree


Conducting research is a necessary step for determining the future of aquaculture, and that means going into the open ocean off the U.S. Coast.


There is a political benefit to supporting aquaculture research. A candidate who supports doing the research into aquaculture's benefits and risks has a 2:1 advantage over a candidate who opposes doing the research. This is true across partisan lines.

ABOUT THE POLL

Global Strategy Group conducted a survey of 800 registered voters in New York (statewide), Florida (statewide), coastal California ZIP Codes, coastal Texas ZIP Codes, ME-01, SC-01, WA-01, WA-06, and LA-06 between January 25 and January 29, 2024. The survey has a margin of error of +/-3.5%. Of the 800 interviews, 530 were conducted by telephone and 270 via text invitation to web-based survey. Care has been taken to ensure the geographic, political, and demographic divisions of the population of registered voters are properly represented.
